5th January 2025 is the Feast of the Epiphany

The Epiphany is when the Child Jesus was made manifest to the Magi, wise men from the East, who found Him after following a star. Saint Matthew's Gospel gives no indication of how many wise men there were, but because they give

three gifts, we assume they were three in number; we also assume that 'the East' means Babylonia, a land long associated with astronomy. The wise men remind us that the study of nature will lead us eventually to God, and that at the same time the search for truth can be long and arduous, like their journey. The three gifts are taken to have a symbolic meaning: gold for a king, frankincense for God, and myrrh, a spice used for anointing the dead, for one who is to suffer and to die. We are told, significantly, that 'going into the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother.' The sight of Jesus necessarily involves the sight of Mary as well and vice versa. Moreover it takes place in a house (not the stable of Bethlehem) which reminds us that we shall encounter God in His house, that is, in Church.

Finally we should note the last sentence: 'they departed to their own country by another way.' They return home changed, having seen the Lord. We too must hope that the sight of God will change us.

This afternoon, from 2pm, there is an Epiphany party in the Hall for the children who take part in Children's Liturgy.

<u>Liturgical notes</u>

Next Sunday is the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, after which the 'normal' Sunday cycle begins, and we resume green vestments to signify ordinary time. This will last until Wednesday 5th March, when Lent begins. After today's feast, all Christmas decoration must be removed, but cribs can stay in place until 2nd February, if desired, which is the feast of the Presentation of the Lord, known as Candlemas. You might like to have a good look at our own Crib which will be decommissioned after this year, and replaced with a new one. Some of the figures, especially the poor animals, are a bit battered. If you would like one of the crib figures as a memento, or indeed all of them, please ask. They are looking for a good home!

Once more, many thanks, from Father Alexander, for all the cards and Christmas presents delivered to the Presbytery over the festive period, and many thanks for the Christmas collection. Many thanks to all who made our liturgical celebrations a success: to the flower arrangers, the musicians, the servers, the readers, the extraordinary ministers, the sacristans, the welcomers, those who made tea and coffee and cake, and the Church cleaners. It was a great team effort.



After many years of faithful service as our flower arranger, <u>Margaret Cossou</u> is calling it a day. We are all grateful to her for her hard work, the results of which we can see. Would anyone like to take this over? It has been the custom to decorate the sanctuary with flowers for major feasts; Margaret also looked after the greenery on the altar, making sure it was well watered and dead heads were removed.



The Holy Year, or Jubilee, has begun:

This is a special year in the life of the Church, currently celebrated every 25 years. The most recent ordinary jubilee was in 2000, with Pope Francis calling for an Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy in 2015-2016. Jubilee years have been held at regular intervals in the Catholic Church since 1300, but they trace their roots to the Jewish tradition of marking a jubilee year every 50 years. According to the Vatican website for the jubilee, these years in Jewish history were "intended to be marked as a time to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation, and involved the forgiveness of debts, the return of misappropriated land, and a fallow period for the fields."

Who wants to be an altar server?

You may have noticed that we had five on duty last week at the 10.30am mass, which was excellent as it meant we could have a cross-bearer, a thurifer, two candle-bearers or acolytes, and an incense boat-bearer. This meant that our servers were able to put into practice their liturgical skills learned during the training session to the full. If you want to be an altar sever, the only qualification is to have done your First Holy Communion, along with the commitment to turn up on time and undertake training. Please do not be shy.... We could always do with more.

Core Group Meeting

On Thursday the Core Group met to discuss various matters of interest, which may be of wider interest too. Our finances are steady, which is reassuring. There will be a statement made about them in detail nearer the time of the next Parish general Meeting, which is on Sunday February 9th.

The long running matter of the Hall kitchen is also nearing completion, and we hope to have a new kitchen with new cooker and fridge in due course, which will, among other things, make the place more attractive to hirers. Also under way is the matter of the roof of the lavatories in the Hall.

On spiritual matters we decided that a pilgrimage for the Holy Year would be a good thing: in the month of May it is proposed to visit the Tyburn Convent (near the site of the martyrdom of so many Catholics in penal times) and the Holy Door at Westminster Cathedral. The date is to be finalised.

There are now two days of recollection in Lent, one at Ladywell Convent, the other at Chilworth Monastery, both on the Passion of the Lord, seen through the lens of the Stations of the Cross at one and the Sorrowful Mysteries at the other. More details soon.

Finally, we discussed what the Core Group is for: it is there to provide 'leadership from a team'; in other words to help the parish priest make decisions, not on his own, but after discussion in a forum. Do speak to members of the Core Group if you have any concerns or suggestions you would like to raise.
