# Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> March is the Eighth Sunday of the Year

The readings and prayers can be found in the purple books on page 144. The first reading is from the Book of Sirach, and is a collection of wise sayings about what is in the human mind. Our thoughts reveal our character. What is in our mind is later seen in our actions. In Saint Luke's Gospel, we hear Jesus' teaching that we will be known by our actions; that a good tree bears good fruit. He also tells us not to correct the actions of our neighbours without first paying attention to our own faults.

# This Sunday!

Someone will be having a word about the Lent groups, inviting you to take part, after Holy Communion at all Masses. Also this Sunday! The Exchange of Children's Books, Toys and Equipment is happening in the Hall all morning. Do go in and help yourself to whatever you fancy, and/or drop off whatever is surplus to requirements. <u>Next Sunday the Uniformed Groups of the parish will be on parade at the 10.30am Mass,</u> and we are going to be speaking about, among other things, their charitable endeavours, which chimes in nicely with our Lenten Almsgiving. This year they have chosen to support the Food Bank.

## <u>Liturgical notes</u>

Lent begins this week, on Ash Wednesday, which marks forty days until Easter, forty days of prayer, penance and almsgiving in preparation for the celebration of the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Our Lord. This weekend, the last before Lent, is traditionally a time of celebration and Carnival.
Tuesday is Mardi Gras or Shrove Tuesday, when you should use up all the rich foods you are not going to eat in Lent. Wednesday is Ash Wednesday, and Mass is at 10am, with the imposition of ashes. The ashes are made from the palms used last Palm Sunday. The imposition of Ashes is an ancient tradition that signifies our intention to do penance for our sins, and to turn to the Lord. Everyone is encouraged to receive the ashes, Catholic or not, apart form very young children who have no sins and therefore nothing to repent of.
On Friday, Stations of the Cross are at 7pm, and will last about 25 minutes. The original Stations (stopping places) are to be found in Jerusalem along the Via Dolorosa, the Sorrowful Way, which traces the path from the Antonia Fortress, where Jesus was condemned to death, to the mound of Calvary where he was crucified, and the Holy Sepulchre, where he was buried. In the Middle Ages, when pilgrimage to Jerusalem became difficult, Calvaries were constructed in Europe, being mountains with fourteen chapels along a processional route, and stations were instituted in all churches. Thus, though we cannot go to Jerusalem, we can, in our hearts and minds, follow the Via Dolorosa, and Our Lord as he carries His Cross.

#### Daily Mass in the week is on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10am. On Tuesday Mass is at 7am and on Thursday, Mass is at 7pm. Confessions are on Saturday from 10.30am until at least 11am, along with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament.

We are doing our best to improve the chapel to the right of the main altar, which has the picture of Saint Philip Howard and our patron Saint Clement. We have altar cloths on order for both side altars and we are going to move the cupboard to a less conspicuous place. In addition, we have ordered some new altar linens, that is, purificators and finger towels, as the ones we have are very old and threadbare and coming to the end of their lives.

<u>This Thursday A to Z of Catholicism takes place after the 7pm Mass, with 'L is for Lourdes.'</u> All are welcome. We shall be looking at why the message of Lourdes is so important for the Church, its historical context, and why the Marxists hate it so very much.



## <u>Assisted Dying Bill</u>

The Assisted Dying Bill is making progress through Parliament. In the Committee stage, which we were told would look at any flaws in the legislation, the Bill has been significantly liberalised. For example, the requirement that each death would have to be signed off by a High Court judge has been dropped. Instead, each application will be scrutinised by a panel of experts, all of whom, we assume, will be in favour of assisted dying. A highly restrictive law is being loosened up even before it is enacted by parliament.

This follows the pattern of legislation in Canada & Belgium, where death by euthanasia is very common. Let us remember that the Catholic Church teaches that life is of infinite value at all stages, and that pain relief & palliative care are a better way than suicide in dealing with terminal illness. You might like to write to our MP, who supported the Bill, and try and change her mind, pointing out that this Bill opens the way for weak and vulnerable people being persuaded to end their lives against their own will.
